If yes, give a brief descripiton and a list of modules currently operational (maximum 500 words)	The college is connected to iHRMS portal of the state Government. The portal maintains a record of the service of all the regular employees including ACR, leave etc. As far as financial management is concerned the salary and bills are being processed online. The transaction of bills is done through PFMS system as the college is registered with Public Financial management System (PFMS), Ministry of Finance. The college is planning to start online admission in session 201920. Admission campaigns are already managed by the college on its social media sites. The exam record of the students is being maintained by the college and the affiliating university. The examination forms and internal assessment are already being uploaded on the University portal since 2017. The results of the students could also be downloaded by the students online. The scholarship forms are filled and sent to Welfare Department online since 2018. MIS has helped a lot in recording and collecting information regarding personal data of students, exam records, and library details. Office administrators have easy access to verification information and scholarship and exam related data. It enables the office and teachers to access information they need for

	effective planning, policy development, and evaluation, to align academic processes and deliver a better student experience. Stored data consequently aids the institution in better and timely decision making. The Dept of Higher Education is planning to create a central repository of the staff and student data in near future. The college has been continuously digitalizing and streamlining its data management over the last few years and will come up with a more structured and centralized MIS in future.

Government College Dera Bassi- a pioneering institution of higher education in Dera Bassi Tehsil of District SAS Nagar Mohali, Punjab is affiliated to the Punjabi University Patiala. The institution is continuously contributing to the academic excellence of the region. The foundational idea of the institution was to deliver quality education among the students of rural area. The college is presently offering graduate courses in Arts, Commerce, Science (Non-Medical) disciplines, along with it college also offers B.Com (Honors) and BCA degree courses under Self Finance Scheme. With the primary aim of academic excellence, the college also gives equal importance to inculcating moral values and character building among students. Being an affiliated college, the institution does not have autonomy to frame the syllabus and structure of courses, but it tries to teach the prescribed syllabus of the University. The planning and method of teaching are based on the needs of the course & curriculum. As courses of Commerce require interaction with the industrial sector, so learned faculty tries to make possible such interactions through different events. Similarly, subjects like Home Science, Environment and Road Safety Awareness, Geography & Sociology have provisions of field study, surveys & study tours. Apart from these activities the institution also tries to bring ICT methods in classroom teaching through smart classrooms.

Policies and Procedures The college has been following certain policies over the years regarding the use and maintenance of its infrastructure. Various procedures have been adopted to augment, utilize, maintain and write off the facilities and equipment at the college. The purchase committee evaluates the requirements of different departments by consulting the respective department and committee heads and decides to purchase the suggested item or facility. The purchased items are issued to the departments and committees who have made the requisition. The source of funding is to be decided by the Bursar. Major construction work has been done through RUSA grants. The college has instituted a Building and Maintenance Committee to look after new construction and its maintenance. The departments with practical subjects have laboratories and lab attendants who are responsible for keeping a record of the lab equipment and report if any repair is required. The library restorer takes care of the library infrastructure including books, journals, furniture, computers. The library committee is responsible for the upgradation of library in all respects whether it is the purchase of new books, software, subscription of online libraries. The servicing and repair of physical facilities at the college including water coolers, ACs, photocopiersare undertaken by the departments concerned through the maintenance committee. The ICT facilities are looked after by the Department of Computer Science which comes under HEIS of the college and most of its requirements are met from HEIS fund. The laptops are issued to the staff whenever required. The department analyses the data needs, upgradation of wifi, need for laptops and printers according to the changing times and suggests new purchases or repairs. The department of Physical Education is responsible for the upkeep of playing field, track, sports equipment and gymnasium. The lush lawns of the college are maintained by gardeners under the supervision of environment committee.At the end of each financial year, the college undertakes the stock checking of the total equipment, furniture, machines and gadgets of the college and unusable items are written off after checking.

#### 7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 - Describe at least two institutional best practices

Best practice of the institution Practice -1 1. Title of the practice: Yoga workshop for students and staff. 2. Objective of the practice To empower the students emotionally and spiritually, particularly students from the disadvantaged section and the surrounding backward and rural areas. 3. The context that required the initiation of the practice Though the students and therefore the college were progressing by leaps and bounds in terms of academics, enrolment and infrastructure, yet the college could not tap their full potential owing to the low self-esteem of students, their domestic problems and lack of vision. Moreover, they hardly found time for exercise at home due to many household responsibilities. 4. The Practice The college

organized a month-long Yoga workshop for students and teachers. Experts from IIYN were called to train them in asanas and pranayama. It helped students and staff in overcoming doubts about their abilities, focused their energy and composed them on the campus itself. 5. Evidence of success The students and staff felt spiritually enlightened and empowered after yoga sessions. They were relieved of the oppressive stress. Their efficiency increased manifold and they were able to perform better. 6. Problems faced The students were reluctant to join the practice as they were not aware of the benefits of yoga. The time for practice had to be carved out from their timetable. 7. Impact of the practice It empowered them mentally and spiritually and prepared them to face any difficulties with courage and equanimity. It also made them more disciplined, focused and well-behaved. 8. Resources required- 1. Space and yoga mats for practicing 2. Expert acharayas to train the students and staff Best practice of the institution - 2 1. Title of the practice: Construction of the college boundary wall with the collaboration of local community. 2. Objective of the practice: To prohibit the entry of outsiders, anti-social elements and animals into the premises, thus making the campus a safe sanctuary for students. 3. The context that required the initiation of the practice: The boundary wall of the college was old and damaged and needed to be repaired. The breach in the wall lead to trespassing and posed risk to the safety and discipline of the college. 3. The Practice: The college works in close proximity with the local community and enjoys a symbiotic relationship with the surrounding industry and community. The college has a large area and is surrounded by a long wall which was old and crumbling. The IQAC suggested inviting the local business Industrial Association Derabassi to sponsor the building of wall. Meetings were held in this regard and college was able to get financial help from the local industry apart from this, the local industry and community has contributed towards the beautification of the college campus and maintenance of the morning walkers' track. 4. Evidence of success: Finally, a strong wall was built and campus beautified. 5. Problems faced: The college had to identify and approach the right kind of industry representatives. The college was able to do the liaisoning with the mediation of the SDM. 6. Impact of the practice: 1. About 40 years' old wall was restored and reconstructed. 2. Gazebo and lawns for girls were created. 3. It helped build long-term relationship with local companies. 4. Resources required: 1. The Principal and senior staff members held a series of discussions with the representatives of industry association. 2. The college helped organize meditation camps in industrial units as a token of gratitude.

#### 7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

INSTITUTIONAL DISTINCTIVENESS The college caters to the students belonging to the surrounding rural area and they are mainly from financially weak and socially disadvantaged strata. The primary mission of the college is to build the capacity of the students and boost their confidence. The college has a mentoring system in place in the form of tutorial groups. The tutors guide the students on all matters - academic, career related or even personal. The college thus follows an inclusive approach while dealing with the students. The students are totally transformed by the time they graduate. The college facilitates the students in availing various scholarships offered by the government to SC/ ST/ OBCs, minority community and meritorious students. The

Scholarship Committee informs the students about the scholarship schemes of the Central and State governments and guides them about the application process. At the institutional level, non-SC poor students are allowed to pay fees in instalments. Due to the efforts of the college, the no of scholarship applications are increasing every year and more SC students are opting for education. Students are encouraged to participate in Youth Festivals for the necessary exposure, polishing and showcasing their talent. Talent hunt competitions are organized at the beginning of the session to identify young talent. The college organized more than 40 activities for students including trips, visits to art exhibitions, national level dance performance by eminent artists and competitions which provided ample opportunities to students for growth and critical thinking. The departments of Fine Arts and Home Science engaged their students in practical activities. This year special emphasis was laid on spiritual health and mental well-being. A month-long yoga workshop was conducted for students. The beautification of the college was undertaken to provide suitable ambience to students for study and recreation. The college is situated in a growing industrial township and local representatives of the surrounding industry show a keen interest in the growth of the institute. It has immensely benefitted the institute. The building of the old and crumbling boundary wall of the college with the help of industry association is a testimony to this fact. The college keeps adding to its IT and library infrastructure so that the students can keep pace with the fast changing world and compete with their urban counterparts.
