

1.1 Class Passed from Government College Dera Bassi





Are you satisfied with the prescribed syllabus? 210 responses




90.5% Students were satisfied with the prescribed syllabus and 9.5% Students are not satisfied.


76.7% students feel that the existing syllabus prepares them for jobs while 23.3% do not agree.

Ques 5: -


Was your performance in assignments discussed with you? 210 responses

Ques6: -


The teaching and mentoring process in your institution facilitates you in cognitive, social and emotional growth. 210 responses
