1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Government College, Dera Bassi is nestled in the lap of nature around 700 mts from the Chandigarh-Ambala Road. It was founded in the primary school building of the town on January 15, 1975.

- This semi-urban co-education college affiliated to Punjabi University, Patiala, caters to the students of the region bordering Haryana. Around 1563 students are enrolled in the current session.
- The college benefits from its proximity to Chandigarh and closely works with the local industry representatives.
- The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) was established in July 2002.
- The college was accredited with B+ grade in February 2004 and B grade in February 2016.
- The IQAC according to the latest UGC guidelines was formulated in 2016.
- The IQAC is the think tank of the college and determines the direction of its progress within the framework of govt guidelines while adhering to the vision and mission of the college. It has been conducting three meetings per year for ensuring the quality of teaching-learning and upgrading its infrastructure.
- The IQAC is taking steps for the smooth implementation of NEP-2020.
- It is preparing for the third cycle of accreditation in 2023.

Vision

To become the preferred destination for aspirants of higher education from the surrounding areas.

Mission

To impart quality education at affordable rates.

To provide equal opportunities without any discrimination to all students.

To keep pace with time in the field of information technology.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

1. Government College, Dera Bassi, has plenty of green cover. It is located in the forest area and acts as a carbon sump of the industrial town of Dera Bassi.
2. As Dera Bassi is a small town, the college forms part of its close-knit society. The industry representatives and alumni are like the extended family of the college and provide support to the college in most of the extension activities.
3. The college provides a safe and hence nurturing environment to its students for their talents to flourish. It

has got 38 cameras fitted for surveillance.

4. An NGO Youth Dreamers Foundation closely works with the college to provide financial help to economically weaker students.
5. The college and the local administration work in tandem that brings out excellent results leading to growth.
6. The college lacks adequate staff but due to the prevailing work culture, the college accomplishes monumental tasks.
7. Dera Bassi being an industrial town, the local industry is forthcoming with financial help and employment opportunities for the students.
8. The college has an active Placement Cell which conducts activities involving students throughout the year.
9. The college uses IT with great facility in teaching as well as e-governance. It continuously updates itself to keep pace with the changing technologies.
10. The college acts as a nodal institute of SVEEP for electoral process awareness.
11. The college is a nodal institute for PMS scholarship in the area and disseminates information to and collects information from other Government/ Private/ Aided colleges under it.

Institutional Weakness

1. The college suffers from a shortage of staff that puts an additional strain on every member.
2. The college is not offering any PG courses at present.
3. The connectivity to the surrounding areas is not adequate, affecting the admission and commuting to the college.
4. The college needs a bigger auditorium and gymnasium hall.
5. Majority of students are from rural backgrounds and lack communication skills.
6. The students belong to poor strata and hence tend to take up odd jobs adversely affecting their studies.

Institutional Opportunity

1. The college plans to start a PG course soon.
2. The college has ample opportunities to develop linkages with industry.
3. Transport service for better connectivity to villages.
4. Plan to start a vocational course "Digital Marketing" under CSR which also guarantees placement.
5. The college-alumni bond can be strengthened and mutually beneficial initiatives can be taken.
6. The college tries to empower students through skill development so that they don't resort to petty part-time jobs. It also facilitates financial assistance to such students from various sources.

Institutional Challenge

1. Rural students tend to lag behind their urban counterparts in confidence and communication skills.

2. The college faces competition from private colleges.
3. Reaching college is a big challenge as it is slightly off the road.
4. The college is situated on the Punjab-Haryana border. It is neither completely rural or urban. It affects the grants available to the college.
5. Students speak the local dialect which sometimes hinders communication.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

- **Courses Introduced**

- a) Computer Science in BA (2019-20).
- b) Certificate course in Creative and Content Writing (2021-22).
- c) Certificate course in Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Creativity (2021-22).

- **Project work/ Field work:** Around 17 per cent of students participate in fieldwork or project work. Apart from that, practical courses are an integral part of programmes like BSc, BCA, and some courses of BA programme, for example, Fine Arts, Home Science, Music, Physical Education and so on. Students are trained in the practical aspects of their subjects in well-equipped labs.
- **Value-based Education:** Professional ethics, gender, human values, road safety, environment and sustainability and drug abuse are part of the curriculum.
- **Feedback:** The college is collecting feedback from students and alumni using the Google form method from 2020-21. Feedback about the college from teachers, parents and industry representatives is taken informally at the staff and PTA meetings. The college has put the feedback forms for students and alumni on the college website from session 2023-24

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- **Gross enrolment ratio:** GER has increased by 13% in the college. The number of students admitted has increased from 1363 to 1563 from session 2018-2019 to 2022-2023. The seats for reserved categories are filled hundred per cent. Around 80% of the proposed seats have been filled in the last five years.
- **Faculty Development:** The teacher-student ratio is 42:1. Presently 94% of teachers are either NET qualified and/ or MPhil/PhD. No of teachers with Ph. D has increased from 4 in 2018-19 to 11 in 2022 - 2023.
- **ICT-enabled teaching:** The college boasts of an overhead Projector - 1, Multimedia projectors - 5, Impromptu Laptop podium with LCD - 1, 2-point Interactive Digital smart whiteboards - 2, e-journals and books through Infilbnet. Online classes that started as a necessity during the lockdown have strengthened the teaching-learning process. Teachers continue to make use of PPTs, YouTube videos and movies based on their lessons. The college has bought a compact interactive panel in the current

session to further improve the teaching-learning process.

- **Evaluation of learning:** Teachers track the progress of individual students through their classroom performance, response and MSTs. Students are made to do assignments during the semester which forms the basis of their internal assessment. The programme outcomes and course outcomes are shared with the students along with the syllabus at the beginning of the session. The teachers adhere to the stated goals and try their best to achieve them through constant monitoring.
- **Curriculum Enrichment:** The college continuously tries to enrich and enhance the learning experience of its students leading to their holistic development. The number of student activities like expert lectures, workshops, exhibitions, group discussions and nukkad plays organised by the college has gone up over the last 5 years. Students were taken to Science City on a trip in 22-23. They also undertake practicals, field trips, surveys and projects as part of their curriculum.
- **Student Satisfaction Survey:** The college has been using Google form method to collect feedback from students on the teaching-learning process. The responses of the students are collected, analysed and discussed at the IQAC meetings for further action.

Research, Innovations and Extension

• Research Grants

Two of the staff members have got JRF to pursue a PhD and one from Fine Arts Department got a grant from the Centre under the Ministry of Culture in 2018-19.

• Research Contributions

2018-19: Six research papers published in national and international journals and two books/chapters published in international and national conferences.

2019-20: Four research papers in international journals in 2019 and three book chapters published.

2020-21: Two research papers in national/ international journals and one book/chapter published.

2021-22: Two research papers in international journals and two books published.

2022-23: Two research papers published in UGC care-listed journals.

• Extension Activities

2018-19: Free Dental Check-Up Camp organised in collaboration with Sukhmani Dental College, Blood Donation Camp, Nukkad Natak on Cleanliness Drive staged at Derabassi Bus Stand, slogans and posters against social evils painted on the pillars supporting the flyovers by Fine Arts Department, Social Networking Program organised by Sociology Department in Saidpura.

2019-20: Blood Donation Camp organised in collaboration with Indus International Hospital and a rally held on the eradication of stubble burning,

2020-21: Slogan writing, and poster-making competition organised in collaboration with Patel Memorial National College and Dev Samaj College, Chandigarh, poster exhibition on social evils organised in collaboration with the District Administration, Derabassi.

2021-22: Fit India Freedom Run, plantation of trees in Shamlat areas, collection of plastic waste (57 kg) from nearby villages, voters' awareness activities (Mobile Van Route in Zirakpur, Voter Awareness Camp at Derabassi Bus Stand and Market, Motorcycle Rally), Vaccination Camp organised in collaboration with Civil Hospital, Derabassi, training of trainers on Child-Centric Disaster Risk Reduction organised by MGSIPA, Sector 26, Chandigarh in collaboration with the National Institute of Disaster Management in which 6 students participated from the college.

2022-23: Bicycle rally, No Plastic campaign, SVEEP awareness drive, Heritage Survey, Disaster management training, workshops and seminars under Placement Cell drive, blood donation camp, cultural activities in collaboration with Nehru Yuva Kendra, performing beyond the campus duties given by district administration, Department of Higher Education and Welfare Department, participation of college NSS unit in the Central Government **Survey of Youth not in Formal Education or in Regular Employment.**

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- **Building Infrastructure:** The 40 years old boundary wall of the college was reconstructed in 2018-19 with the help of the Industry Association.

The institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching and learning.

- **Sports and Cultural Facilities:** The college has a well-maintained 400-meter track, Kho-Kho Court, football ground and table tennis board, and separate gyms for boys and girls. There is an Open Gym for use by students and the local community in the evening. The college has a seminar hall and two open stages for cultural activities.
- **Library:** The college has a well-equipped library with a seating capacity of 110 students. The main library has 18367 books, periodicals, and reference books, and the HEIS library has 1641 books, an ICT room with Wi-Fi, and a download and printout facility.
- **IT Infrastructure:** The institution provides an internet bandwidth facility of 300 Mbps within the college campus all the time. Laptops and LCD projectors are available in all the smart classrooms. All computer systems have a backup power supply through Gen Set. The college has 30 computers for students and the student-computer ratio is 52:1. Desktops or laptops are issued to teachers as per requirement.
- **Safe Campus:** The college has CCTV surveillance for maintaining security.

Student Support and Progression

- **Scholarships:** No of SC applicants under Ambedkar Scholarship has increased from 171 in 18-19 to 457 in 2022-23. The college signed an MoU with an NGO, Youth Dreamers' Foundation, in March 2022 to financially help the economically weak General Category students and it credited the fees of 227 students amounting to Rs 33,80645 in session 22-23. Apart from this, the college facilitates

students' applications for scholarships such as CM Scholarship, CSSS and Govt College Retired Teachers Welfare Association (Punjab).

- **Enhancement and Development Schemes:** The college has a tutorial system in place. Each tutorial group consists of 50 students and is headed by a tutor. The tutor/ mentor is accessible to the mentees and guides them from time to time. The college also holds frequent yoga and meditation camps for staff and students.
- **Student Progression to Higher Education:** On the basis of available data, the number of students who opted for higher education is 159 in 21-22. However, the actual number may be much higher. The data on students progressing to Higher Education in 22-23 is incomplete as the results have not been announced yet.
- **Student Participation in Sports and Cultural Activities:** Students are encouraged to participate in Sports and Cultural activities. The number of participants in sports and cultural activities is 103 in 22-23.
- **Career Counselling:** No of students benefitted from the guidance on competitive examination and career counselling efforts is 138.
- **Alumni Engagement:** The college organised an alumni meet in March 2022 to strengthen ties with its alumni. The college invites its alumni achievers to the college on formal occasions and felicitates them.
- **Student Grievances:** The college has various mechanisms in place to solve the problems of students. The whole college council is involved in grievance redressal, anti-ragging and Sexual Harassment initiatives to prevent, solve and lay down punitive measures in such cases if any. A Google form link has been created on its website for students to file complaints.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Decentralisation and Participative Management: The functioning of the college is led by its vision and mission. The management system is decentralised and participative as the work is divided among various committees at the start of the session. Each committee is headed by a convener and consists of members as per need. Their work is reviewed by IQAC periodically.

Financial and Administrative Audit: All accounts are monitored and subjected to rigorous audits. Audit can be external or internal as directed by the Department of Higher Education. An Academic and Administrative Audit of the college was conducted by the govt appointed team in May 2022. The college was subjected to an academic and administrative audit by the affiliating university in May 2023 and was adjudged good.

Faculty Development Programmes: The number of faculty who attended various faculty development programmes has increased from 8 in 2018-19 to 25 in 2022-23.

Functioning of IQAC: IQAC meetings are being held every month since November 22. The cell maintains the quality of teaching-learning and updates the procedures and mechanisms for running the college from time to time. It laid special emphasis on the college-industry linkage and the improvement of the Placement Cell in 2022.

E-Governance: The college management has undergone a massive change over the last 5 years. The college has taken to e-governance in all spheres from admission, teaching, and exam-related activities including filling in forms and marks, financial transactions, applying for scholarships and administration.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

- **Gender Equality**

1. The college celebrates International Women's Day almost every year.
2. Seminar on "Personal Hygiene and Physical Cleanliness" was conducted on August 30, 2018, and lectures on "Health and Nutrition Awareness in Adolescents" and "The Importance of Ayurveda in India" were organized on March 8, 2021.
3. The college celebrated National Girl Child Day by participating in "Selfie with Daughter" on January 24, 2022.
4. The college has a well-equipped girls' common room, an exclusive lawn for them and CCTV cameras for ensuring the safety of students.

- **Alternate Sources of Energy:** The institution commissioned a 25 KV rooftop solar plant spending nearly 10 lakhs under the RUSA scheme with a maximum power output of nearly 70 KW in November 2018. Five solar lights have also been installed on the grounds of the college. The college is also using LED bulbs on its premises. All these efforts have reduced the college electricity bill.

- **E-Waste Management:** E-waste bins have been installed in the college so that e-waste produced at the college can be handed over to authorized recyclers.

- **Green Initiatives**

1. Nanak Bagichi was created as part of the 550th Birth Anniversary celebration of Guru Nanak Dev. The college was **awarded a certificate** by the Swatch Bharat Abhiyaan team owing to its clean and green environment. The college has well-maintained lawns and landscaping in the form of a Buddha statue.
2. The NSS unit of the college and Environment Committee frequently undertake activities like plantation drives, and preservation of flora on the campus with the help of the Alumni Association and Forest Department, Derabassi. The college has planted nearly 200 trees in two villages.
3. The college also organized a march past against stubble burning in the surrounding villages of Isapur and Gulabgarh on October 18, 2019.
4. Students of Fine Arts presented a tableau on the importance of environmental conservation at the tehsil-level function of Republic Day.
5. The college got its Energy Audit and Green Audit done and got excellent remarks in the audits.
6. The college has initiated the process for building a water harvesting system in the new building block.

- **Inclusive Campus:** The college has ramps, wheelchairs, a washroom and a parking facility for differently abled persons.

- **Best Practices:** The college is the fountainhead of many best practices such as:

1. **Sharing of Resources:** Utilization of the college track by students as well as the community.
2. **Fit Friday Programme:** It aims to involve all the students in physical activities.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	The college is open to the idea of multidisciplinary education. It will benefit the students in many ways. The flexibility to study subjects across different streams such as science, humanities and commerce will lead to the enhancement of multiple skills among students and sustain their interest in studies. But the new system has to be implemented from above. As the affiliating university and the Higher Education Department make the required amendments to the curriculum and its delivery, the college will step in to do its part. Meanwhile, students from BCom and BCA are taking a keen interest in the newly added certificate courses Creative Writing and Content Development and Entrepreneurship. They are doing quite well.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	Introducing a flexible teaching-learning process is the need of the hour. The college is aware of the concept of Digi locker facility for the students. But the staff and students need proper training about the maintenance of the Academic Bank of Credits. Only then the advantages of holding this digital/virtual/online entity can be extended to students. Furthermore, the universities need to establish a formal system of granting of degrees through credit recognition, credit accumulation, credit transfer and credit redemption as per the guidelines of UGC. The DPI office and the affiliating universities need to work out a detailed procedure for operating this virtual repository or credit 'database' on ABC Platform. As the first step in this direction, the college has made almost 99% of students register with ABC.
3. Skill development:	MOU signed with Vidyawati Memorial Educational & Charitable Society to provide various free-of-cost courses to our toppers from different educational streams. Another MoU has been signed with Friends Union for Energizing Lives for aptitude training, future skill development and digital marketing •The college proposes to introduce courses in Baking, Fashion Designing, Interior Decoration and Digital Marketing under B-Voc programme. .In collaboration with the Mentorpick Platform we wish to enable our students to get a better understanding of their aptitude and choose the most suitable career path. Best Practices for Promoting Self Employment •Career talks on self-employment, personality development

	and SoftCommunication Skills were organised. •Add-on courses in entrepreneurship, creativity and innovations in business, creative writing and content development have been introduced. •The college promotes creativity and provides a platform for budding theatre artists, painters and musicians. It enables them to tread the unconventional career options.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	The present curriculum already offers courses in two Indian languages –Punjabi and Hindi. The courses in other Indian languages may be considered if the infrastructure and facilities are provided to teach them. As the curriculum is prepared by the university, only the affiliating university can incorporate the Indian knowledge system into its curriculum. Under the "Ek Bharat Shrestha Bharat" scheme of the Centre, students are being introduced to the culture, language and cuisine of Andhra Pradesh State through multimedia and practical activities.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The programme and course outcomes are stated on the affiliating university website. They are communicated to the students at the beginning of the session. The course outcomes are evaluated through Mid-semester tests and assignments. Semester-end exams conducted by the affiliating university also indicate whether the outcomes have been achieved or not.
6. Distance education/online education:	The staff and students got familiar with online classes during the lockdown. The teachers continue to provide ppts, notes, and links to relevant subject-specific sites and material in their student WhatsApp groups. So the staff is already following a blended mode of teaching.

Institutional Initiatives for Electoral Literacy

1. Whether Electoral Literacy Club (ELC) has been set up in the College?	The college has a proactive Electoral Literacy Club (ELC) and SVEEP (Systematic Voters' Education and Electoral Participation) committee since 2019. They have been consistently working towards voter awareness among the students and the surrounding community. The committees ensure the maximum

Response:

As per the academic schedule given by the Punjabi University Patiala, a well-structured academic calendar is prepared and is approved by academic council.

The academic calendar provides the date of commencement of the academic session, Tentative mid-semester exam dates and University examinations etc. The academic calendar is shared on the website for faculty members and students prior to the commencement of a semester.

Based on the syllabus and student strength, subject allocation is done based on the workload calculated every semester by the heads of the departments (HoDs).The time table committee prepares the time tables (for class, laboratory and Individual faculty) for all programs every semester.

Each member makes a session plan for efficient content delivery of the allotted subject. For this purpose, the member provides a unit-wise and month-wise distribution of syllabi to be followed and according to the allocation, the faculty completes the syllabus.

In addition to traditional classroom teaching, faculty members also use various ICT tools and active learning strategies through the preparation of teaching material, laboratory manuals, assignments, etc. The process is also supplemented with an online learning management system to make it more effective.

Each faculty maintains a handbook for all the records related to session plans, individual timetables, academic calendar, attendance and continuous evaluation of student and other curriculum-related data.

The gap analysis is done for all the courses belonging to the program and the staff tries to bridge through relevant guest lectures, seminars, workshops, value-added courses, industrial visits, implementing projects etc.

The academic performance of students is continuously and meticulously monitored by conducting special tests, and mid-semester exams, during the semester to assess the learning levels of students and accordingly, assessment of students is done.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

The working out on learning-centric approach used by the college has shaped an environment that is geared towards participative problem solving and peer learning practices among the students. It helps students from being passive recipients to active stakeholders of the college. Due to low social backgrounds, they are allowed to comprehend at their personal level by ensuring their active involvement in class activities. They are encouraged for written assignments to enhance their confidence and develop writing skills and overcome stage fear and develop oratory skills. The college continuously tries to enrich and enhance the learning experience of its students using various methods. Some courses have field trips integrated into their curriculum. They get practical knowledge of their subject through these trips. Apart from this, they are made to present in seminars and attend exhibitions which adds to their experience. Either the departments organise the exhibitions like Fine Arts Department and Home Science Department or the students are taken to other institutions for attending exhibitions for example science exhibition. Students get ample opportunities for participative learning in workshops, group discussions, expert lectures, nukkad plays which are regularly organised by the departments. Students are made to do assignments during the semester which forms the basis of their internal assessment. In addition to traditional class room teaching through chalk and talk method of teaching, the faculty members are using the ICT enabled learning tools such as PPT, Video clippings , Audio system, online sources, to expose the students for advanced knowledge and practical learning. Teachers at the institute have been continuously updating themselves on the technology-enabled teaching. This transition became rapid during COVID lockdown. Whatsapp groups of different classes were created and classes were held online during this period using Google Meet or Zoom. Earlier also teachers prepared study material according to the needs of the students and it was uploaded on the website for their benefit. The college campus is wi-fi since 2015 and it is being continuously upgraded since then. There are two well equipped smart classrooms, a seminar hall and two computer labs which can be used for effective teaching learning. For example, students are shown ppts, Youtube videos and movies based on their lessons. Apart from this there are sufficient laptops for teachers to use. The library has an e catalogue and provides N-List facility, a data base containing books and journals. The college is planning to buy an interactive panel to further improve the teaching learning process.

Apart from this a Free Dental Check-Up Camp was organised in collaboration with Sukhmani Dental College. A Blood Donation Camp was held and a Nukkad Natak on Cleanliness Drive staged at Derabassi Bus Stand. The pillars supporting the Bus Stand flyover were painted by Fine Arts Department addressing social evils. Social Networking Program was organised by Sociology Department in Saidpur and a Blood Donation Camp was organised in collaboration with Indus International Hospital. A rally was held for the eradication of stubble burning. In collaboration with the local administration, SVEEP committee members and students toured the surrounding areas and spread awareness about the right to vote and its importance. Such activities have a positive impact on students sensitizing them about social issues, hence turning them into informed citizens and eventually converting them into valuable human resources. Students also gained awareness of waste management issues by proactively engaging in waste management initiatives. Plastic was banned on campus to promote a sustainable and ecologically friendly lifestyle. The use of jute bags and the segregation of different types of waste, biodegradable and nonbiodegradable, were encouraged.

It has 18367 books, along with periodicals and reference books. In addition to the main library, the college has a separate library for self-financed courses i.e. HEIS library has 1641 books. The college has access to 'National Library And Information Services Infrastructure For Scholarly Content'(N-LIST), being jointly executed by the e-ShodhSindhu Consortium, INFLIBNET Centre and the INDEST-AICTE Consortium, IIT Delhi. Apart from that students are made aware of the National Digital Library of India (NDLI) where thousands of free E-resources, including journals, are available. Our college has access to the SWAYAM programme initiated by the Government of India and designed to achieve the three cardinal principles of education policy viz., access, equity and quality. All e-resources are accessible locally within the campus. The students and staff are registered on InFLIBnet through a username and password. The library has a seating capacity of nearly 110 students. For browsing and relaxed reading, an ICT room has been separately created with excellent ICT infrastructure and seamless access to the Internet.. The library has a separate reference section with a rich collection of Encyclopedia Britannica, Encyclopedia Americana, Year Books, Atlases etc.. Besides these, the Library is also equipped with the latest e-journals by the UGC-INFONET Digital Library Consortium, accessible through campus-wide LAN. These funds are utilised for all recurring and non-recurring expenditures. All the major financial decisions are taken by the institute after consultations with different committee heads, financial advisors and the Principal. The quotations called and purchase orders are placed after negotiations. All transactions have transparency through bills and vouchers. The bill payments are passed after verification of items. Both external and internal financial audits are conducted to verify the compliance.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Response:

The IQAC cell of the college has contributed significantly to maintaining and improving the quality of the teaching-learning process. It has set procedures and institutionalised mechanisms to ensure the effectiveness of teaching. The old-age system of stating the objectives, delivering the curriculum and testing the students' learning levels has become multidimensional and sophisticated. The IQAC has played a vital role in setting benchmarks, making changes to meet those standards and evaluating the effectiveness of its decisions. Teaching learning has been revolutionised by ICT-enabled teaching, tutorials, continuous assessment, internal assessment, practicals, surveys, projects and so on. Over the past few years, the IQAC has recommended creating more smart classrooms, developing e-content, maintaining an interactive website, connecting with students through social media, and introducing skill development programmes. The IQAC has strengthened the student support system by creating suitable platforms like Student Grievance Cell, Women Harassment Cell and Anti-ragging Committee. IQAC encourages the participation of teachers in Faculty Development Programmes by laying down the rule of duty leave. After the lockdown, IQAC suggested various corrective measures to get the studies back on track. Online teaching, sharing of study material, interaction through WhatsApp groups, and online admission was some of the steps taken by the college on the recommendation of the IQAC. Yoga practice sessions were introduced and are still frequently held to ensure the mental and physical health of students. The IQAC also gave directions to strengthen the Placement Cell of the college. It has been greatly helping the students who are mostly from rural and poor strata.

Response:

Many programmes were conducted at the college underlining the importance of gender equity. These include a poster-making competition on female foeticide, a slogan writing competition, Teej festival celebration, play "Man Mitti da Bolya" organised by Women Cell. Celebration of the 100th Anniversary of the famous Punjabi writer and editor of "Nagmani"- Amrita Pritam, International Women's Day, student visit to a workshop by contemporary Indian women artists are some of the activities organised by the college. Yeah Dar kaisa hai, a woman-oriented play, was staged in the college. A seminar was conducted on Judo to mark women's empowerment. Women empowerment day was celebrated by the Commerce Department to motivate women to open startups. Under Poshan Pakhwada, Dr. (Prof.) Poonam Khanna and Dr. Rachana Srivastav from the Department of Community Medicine and School of Public Health, PGI, Chandigarh, delivered a special lecture on hygiene, anaemia and menstrual health for girls students. A poster-making competition was also organised on the occasion. A mehndi competition was organised by the Home Science department on Karva Chauth. A one-day seminar was held on the occasion of International Women's Day. Resource persons Dr. Sangeeta Jain SMO, GCH, Dera Bassi and Dr. Sonia Singla, Ayurvedic Incharge, Panjokheri, Derabassi, delivered lectures on "Health and Nutrition Awareness in Adolescents" and "Deep Roots of Ayurveda in India" respectively. One-act play entitled "Mujhe Nayaya kab Milega" depicting gender-based violence was staged, poems recited and skits were performed by students. Prof. Jagmohan Singh (retired) delivered a lecture on "Legal Aspects of Maintaining Harmony in Country and Legal Aid to Underprivileged Sections" on 31st Oct 2021. He also talked about women's rights and elaborated on the ways to fight legally against social injustice prevalent in society on Rashtriya Ekta Diwas. The college has a Dispensary and a First Aid club for students, especially girls. They are also provided sanitary napkins free of cost. The college has a Common Room and two washrooms for girls. A pigeonhole locker and a sanitary napkin vending machine are installed in the girls' common room. The college has an exclusive garden with a gazebo for girls named CHIDIYAN DA CHAMBA. The college has separate Gyms for girls and boys. The college council acts as a women's cell and looks into gender-specific problems if any.

The college sensitizes its students to gender-specific challenges and concerns. Sufi Kalam and songs on motherhood were presented by the Music department during the Alumni Meet on March 12, 2022. A poster-making competition was organised by Sociology Department on women empowerment on May 6, 2022. The college celebrated National Girl Child Day by participating in the "Selfie with Daughter" programme and preparing a collage of these selfies of the staff and their daughters. Govt College Dera Bassi educates young girls to voice their opinions regarding issues related to women. Dos and don'ts of cybersecurity have been put on the wall magazine and the notice board in the girls' Common Room. The campus is under CCTV surveillance. Gatekeepers are deployed to ensure the screening of visitors at the

entry point to the college.

Response:

The college organizes several activities to promote an environment of communal harmony and inculcate ethical and spiritual values among them. The days commemorated for religious purposes include the birthdays and martyrdom days of Sikh gurus. The college also pays homage to freedom fighters by celebrating their birthdays and observing their martyrdom days. All festivals including Diwali, Lohri, Basant Panchmi, and Teej are celebrated together on the campus and students participate in them irrespective of their caste, religion and region. Students from different backgrounds participate in all events like Teachers' Day, oath ceremonies, plantation drives, International Women's Day, Yoga Day etc.

The college caters to students belonging to different castes, communities and socio-economic strata and it treats all of them equally. The students who fulfil the eligibility conditions, get scholarships irrespective of their religion. Under the Central government's programme Ek Bharat Shreshtha, Andhra Pradesh cuisine was prepared spreading message of national integration. Hindi Day and Punjabi Mah are also celebrated to acquaint students with the richness of all languages and cultures.

The institution is committed to fulfilling the constitutional obligations: values, rights, duties and responsibilities of citizens and continuously works towards the sensitization of its students and employees to their duties. The celebration of important days like Republic Day, Independence Day, Constitution Day, Unity Day, and National Voters' Day are reminders to the staff and students of the college to uphold the dignity of our country by becoming responsible citizens. All days of national importance are celebrated with zeal and enthusiasm. The college closely works with the local administration to celebrate days of national importance. Its playgrounds are used for most of the

government functions and the college ensures full participation of its staff and students in them to mark other days like Unity Day, Constitution Day or Martyrdom Day of Shahid Bhagat Singh. The college participates in all national missions/ campaigns like Azadi ka Amrut Mahotsav, Fit India Run, Green India, Clean India and so on. The college celebrated National Girl Child Day in online mode by starting a "Selfie with Daughter" programme. Students often participate in the activities of Nehru Yuva Kendra, an organisation that continuously makes efforts to involve the Indian youth in nation-building. One of our students, Amanpreet Singh, went on to represent the state in a declamation contest on the subject of patriotism and nation-building.

Reverence towards constitutional obligations, values, rights, duties and responsibilities is constantly nurtured among students to make them better citizens. Celebration of Constitution Day, talks of Eminent personalities inspire students to follow the core values of the country and adhere to a code of conduct. It develops a sense of responsibility and leadership qualities among students. Blood donation camps, Van Mahotsav, Mission Salamati and many extension/ community outreach programmes under Swachh Bharat Abhiyan and voters' awareness programs under SVEEP spread awareness among students about their duties as citizens. In collaboration with the local administration, members of the SVEEP committee along with students toured the surrounding areas and talked to people about their right to vote and its importance. Interactive sessions on issues like drug addiction, stubble burning, cleanliness and sanitation, environment and women-related issues are also organized.

Sportspersons not belonging to this college are also able to use this track and benefit from the facility.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1

Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

It is very difficult to pinpoint one area in which the college has excelled. Still the following are some of the key focus areas in which the college has made its mark. Although our college is small and its staff is limited, it has taken big leaps and met astounding results. Govt College, Dera Bassi, is situated in the small industrial town of Dera Bassi. It has used its unique location and proximity to Chandigarh to its best advantage. As Dera Bassi is a small town, all branches of this close knit society work in tandem. One area in which Government College, Dera Bassi, excels is its symbiotic and organic relationship with its surrounding community, industry, alumni, local administration and other bodies. The college reaches out to them and they reciprocate leading to healthy co-existence and simultaneous growth. The college has reaped rich dividends in the past due to this approach.

Government College, Dera Bassi, is the Nodal college for SC scholarships serving almost 24 colleges. The college acts as a nodal institute for SVEEP activities too in Dera Bassi tehsil. The college has an open-air gym that caters to the surrounding community as well as students. The institution shares very cordial relations with the Industrial Association of the town. Their members are always ready to support the college in every possible manner. They sponsored the building of the college boundary wall, Gazebo, stairs of the stadium and gatekeeper's room with furniture and attached washroom. Stair work is in progress. The college's core strength is its association with Nehru Yuva Kendra. This organisation involves college youth in many activities related to nation-building, social harmony, national integration, skill development and many other competitions.

The college caters to students belonging to the surrounding rural area and they are mainly from financially weak and socially disadvantaged strata. The primary mission of the college is to build the capacity of students and boost their confidence. The college has a mentoring system in place in the form of tutorial groups. The tutors guide the students on all matters – academic, career-related or even personal. The college thus follows an inclusive approach while dealing with students. The students are totally transformed by the time they graduate. The college facilitates the students in availing various scholarships offered by the government to SC/ ST/ OBCs, minority communities and meritorious students. The Scholarship Committee informs the students about the scholarship schemes of the Central and State governments and guides them through the application process. At the institutional level, non-SC poor students are allowed to pay fees in instalments. Due to the efforts of the college, the no of

scholarship applications is increasing every year and more SC students are opting for education. The unique feature of the college is financial help from an NGO active in the Dera Bassi area, YOUTH DREAMERS FOUNDATION. It has offered scholarships amounting to almost 30 lakh rupees in the year 22-23.

Students are encouraged to participate in extra-curricular activities, NSS initiatives, Cultural activities, seminars and conferences to polish their talent. It helps students to work on their capabilities and gain an edge. They are urged to participate in Youth Festivals for the necessary exposure, polishing and showcasing their talent. Talent hunt competitions are organized at the beginning of the session to identify young talent. The college organized many activities for students including trips, visits to art exhibitions, national-level dance performances by eminent artists and competitions which provided ample opportunities to students for growth and critical thinking. The departments of Fine Arts and Home Science engaged their students in practical activities. This year special emphasis was laid on spiritual health and mental well-being. A month-long yoga workshop was conducted for students. The college has planted more than 800 saplings in the surrounding areas of Derabassi in collaboration with its adopted village Mukandpur, Forest Department, district administration, Himachal Kalyankari Sabha and Morning Walkers Club etc. under various plantation drives this year. The college conducted a seminar on “Environmental issues and necessity of Sanitation” in August 2018 under the patronage of Dr. Naresh Kumar, Manager, the Swachh Bharat Mission Scheme (Urban). The best part of the college is that it gifts plants to its invited resource persons, other invitees and guests.

In 2020-21, the college has been able to achieve the goal of e-governance. Most of the examination work is also being done through online portals. The faculty created class-wise whatsapp groups on their mobile phones and disseminated important notices and teaching material.

The local community in the form of Morning Walkers' Club makes use of its track and has taken upon itself the duty of maintaining it in return. The Morning Walkers' Club also funded the installation of an Open Air Gym on the campus. Many members of the club are alumni of the college. The old and crumbling boundary wall of the college was repaired with the help of the industry association. It also helped in the beautification of the college. The local MLA is also an alumnus of the college. If there is any issue to be resolved at the end of the government, he takes up the issues with the authorities concerned. The college has taken significant steps for the vocationalization of education as stipulated in the NEP. The local industry representatives, also members of IQAC, are ready to provide training to the students. The college has also signed MoUs with industry and other organisations for the skill enhancement of its students.

The college organises *Sukhmani Sahib Path* at the start of the session to make an auspicious beginning. It invokes God and upholds spiritual values in all matters of importance. Its staff collectively prepares and serves *prasad* on Gurburabs.

The college understands the power of social media and hence connects with its stakeholders through its Facebook and Twitter accounts and YouTube channel. YouTube videos of its programmes are also in circulation.

The college campus is lush green and inviting. Many music videos and Punjab Government promotional video "Sada Kamm Bolda" have been shot here.
